Articles are parts of speech. **A**, **an** and **the** might be small words but they do a big job. An article is like an arrow that points to a noun. If you see the words - a, an or the, a noun is sure to follow.

A and **an** are only used with singular nouns. Singular nouns are *one* person, place, thing or animal. A good rule to remember is that **A** is used before words that begin with a consonant. **An** is used before words that begin with vowels - a, e, i, o, or u.

An *apple* is good to eat.
