DIRECT OBJECTS VERBS THAT ACT ON SOMETHING

Verbs are words that express action or a state of being in a sentence. *Action verbs* express physical and mental actions. Run, talk, hope, wish or swim are all action verbs. *State of being* verbs express a condition or state of being. Be, feel, seem, or appear are all state of being verbs.

A **transitive verb** is an action verb that is followed by a *direct object*. It is an action that is performed *on* something. Some sentences would not make sense unless the verb had a direct object to *receive* the action.

Carol drew . . . What did Carol draw?
The class played with . . . What did the class play with?

To have these sentences make more sense, you could add a direct object. **Direct objects** are nouns or pronouns that *receive* the action of the verb. For example:

Carol drew a picture.

Drew is the verb. What did Carol draw? A picture.

Picture is the **direct object** in this sentence.

Picture *receives* the action of the verb.

The class played with a new soccer ball.

Played is the verb. What did the class play with? Soccer ball.

Soccer ball is the **direct object** in this sentence.

Soccer ball *receives* the action of the verb. It is what is *played* with.

An easy way to find the direct object in a sentence is to ask yourself some questions. Who is doing the action? What is the verb? What *receives* the action of the verb? For instance:

Martha baked cookies.

Who is doing the action? Martha. What is the verb? Baked. What did Martha bake? Cookies. So, cookies *receives* the action of the verb. Cookies is the **direct object.**
