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Using Personal Pronouns

Reading and Discussion

What is a **pronoun**? A pronoun is a word that takes the place of a noun. You have learned that nouns name any person, place, or thing. Pronouns stand for people or things too. The difference is that pronouns do not name them.

Personal pronouns take the place of nouns that name people or sometimes things. They can be used as either the **subject** or the **object** in a sentence.

Subject pronouns are personal pronouns that are used as either the subject of a sentence or a predicate noun. **I, it, he, she, they, we, you** are often used as subject pronouns. For example:

- I rode my bike along the Little Miami River trail. **I** is the subject.

I usually comes before the verb in a sentence. If your subject has more than one person and **I** shares the subject, always put **I** last. For example:

- Aunt Sally and **I** rode our bikes along the Little Miami Trail. **Aunt Sally** and **I** are the subjects. We put **I** last.

When we use a personal pronoun as a predicate noun, the pronoun comes after the verb. For example:

- It was **we** who ate the cake.

We is used as a predicate noun. It comes after the verb.

Object pronouns can be used as direct or indirect objects, or as the object of a preposition. **Her, him, it, me, them, you, us** can be used as object pronouns. Object pronouns tell who or what received the action of the verb. They are often used after prepositions such as **for, to, or with**. For example:

- Grandma saw her drop the cake.
- My brother told me to give him the cake.
- Harry and Sam are riding their bikes with us.

Pronouns often come in subject and object pairs. If you find one in a sentence as the subject, you might find the next part of the pair used as the object.

- I told her to give that book to me.

Some common pairs are:

- **I/me, you/you, she/her, we/us, they/them, and he/him.**

Activity A
